Economics 101 The Art and Science of Decision Making: Making Choices in and out of the Classroom during your time at Northwestern

Economists have been studying the returns to formal education for decades. More recently both behavioral and experimental approaches have been utilized to better understand the benefits of investing in higher education. Students will reflect both personally and across other individuals to begin to determine what they hope to gain during the next four years both in- and outside of the classroom. We will use standard economic models, experimental design, behavioral economic concepts, research from other disciplines on this topic and empirical evidence to enable each student to begin to personalize their plans during their time at Northwestern. The class will visit or be visited by various functions across the University (Career Advancement, Fellowships, Chicago Field Studies) so they can better understand and utilize these during the next four years.

The goal of the course is to give the student the ability to critically evaluate both the literature on the decision making and returns to investments in human capital. Students will look at these both in the context of the general population, and from their individual experience and potential impact on their decision making process.

The class will consist of short formal lecturers, informal class discussions, group and individual student presentations. Grades will be based on written assignments, class participation, and formal and informal presentations..

On Writing Assignments:

All written work will be judged on its organization, clarity, grammar, and the extent to which class concepts and materials are integrated into the analysis. All sources used must be carefully referenced, including class texts, readings, and other reference materials. You will be required to bring a rough draft, for one assignment prior to when the assignment is due. Students will review each other's work for this assignments.. Peer evaluations will count as part of class participation.

Students must upload their papers by the time/day noted on our canvas website. Any late assignment will automatically be penalized 10%. If illness or a personal situation makes it impossible for you to meet this deadline you must be able to document the incident. For the former you should go to Searle and make sure they note your situation. No exceptions will be made.

When working on writing assignments for this class, I encourage you to visit the Writing Place. Located in the Main Library, the Writing Place is Northwestern's center for peer writing consultations. The juniors and seniors who staff the Writing Place can provide you with feedback and assistance at any stage in the writing process. They will not edit your work. Rather, they will work with you to brainstorm ideas, organize or outline an essay, clarify your argument, document your sources correctly, or refine grammar and

style. Though walk-in consultations are possible if space is available, it's best to book a consultation in advance via the online schedule at www.writing.northwestern.edu.

Class Participation:

Students are expected to attend each class, unless special arrangements are made prior to class. Students should come to class prepared to support their point of view with course and outside materials. In addition each student will be required to participate in group project. They will run a behavioral experiment in the class, and then individually analyze the results for one of the class paper. Students will also be responsible to present a summary of their final paper to the class. Students' contributions to each of these responsibilities will be judged on the strength and clarity of the arguments presented.

Students cannot use cell phones during class in order to maintain the best learning environment for themselves and their classmates
