

## Northwestern Undergraduates: Are you looking for a paid summer research opportunity?

**Earn money and gain hands-on research experience at the Institute for Policy Research (IPR) as a Summer Undergraduate Research Assistant. Learn about the research process with IPR faculty experts and work on real studies.**

- Pay is \$18 per hour.
- Students typically work 35 hours per week for 10 weeks, but schedules can be flexible.
- Those majoring in social science fields are preferred, but all majors are welcome.
- Some possibility of continued work with professors during the academic year.
- Previous research experience is a plus but not required.
- At the beginning of the program, students will participate in a training session on statistical methods and computing and receive tips on being a good research assistant.
- Remote work may be possible at the discretion of the faculty, but no work is permitted to be conducted outside of the U.S.

- Undergraduate applications will be accepted from **Monday, February 16** through **Friday, March 13** at 11:59 p.m. CT. Late applications will not be accepted.
- Students who have not been chosen for a position will be notified by **Wednesday, April 22**.

### Eligibility

The program is open to all Northwestern first-years, sophomores, and juniors. International students must have a valid F-1 student visa.

- Graduating seniors and students from other institutions are not eligible.
- Selection will be based on the student's record, the faculty member's proposed research, and the proposed role of the student in that research.
